PREREQUISITES: None

DESCRIPTION: This course is designed to introduce the student to medical terms, including roots, prefixes, and suffixes, with emphasis on spelling, definition and pronunciation.

This course introduces the student to the basic rules for interpreting, constructing, and spelling medical terms. Each course lesson includes common terms, definitions and pronunciations for prefixes, suffixes general body terms, and terms which relate to each body system. Each body system lesson includes terms for anatomy, pathology, pharmacology, x-ray, and surgical test and procedures. Emphasis is upon learning word roots, prefixes and suffixes and how they are combined rather than learning each individual term.
